

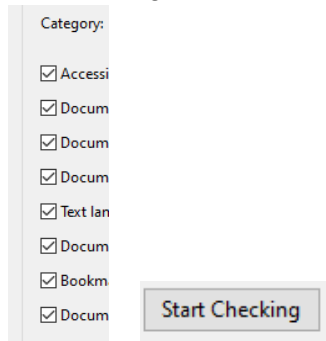
How to add or change an image's alternate text with Acrobat Pro (with video) | Adobe Acrobat Pro DC
text to images allows screen reader technologies) to provide visually impaired readers with a better understanding of a document's contents overall.

Open your PDF document in Acrobat Pro. The quickest way to determine if the images in the file have alt text embedded within them is to move your mouse over them slowly. If the tooltip changes to crosshairs with a line of highlighted text next to it, then the image has alternate text embedded within it.

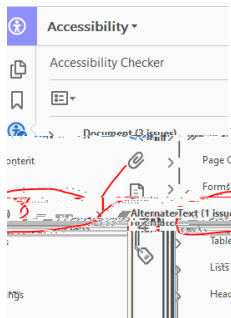
If there is no line of highlighted text, or if you have a long document with many images that need to be batch-checked, you will have to run an Accessibility Report to determine the status of the images.

To run the report, you need to use Acrobat's Accessibility tools, which you will add now if they

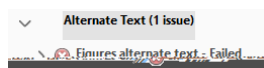
7. Next, in the Accessibility Toolbox, click Full Check. This will open the Accessibility Checker Options popup window. Leave all the options checked on, and click the Start Checking button.



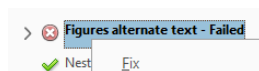
8. Next, an Accessibility pane will open to the left of your document pane. In this example, the Checker has alerted you to one issue relating to Alternate Text.



- a. Twirl down the the arrow that alert. Once opened, the image (figure) that is problematic will have a red-x next to it. Right click on the error alert.



- b. A drop down menu will open and offer a "Fix" option – click Fix



- c. A popup window will appear which will prompt you to enter Alternate Text for the figure. Enter a brief sentence or two in the prompt. Ideally your text phrase should begin with "Image is of a ..." Your reader will then recognize that what is being read is separate from the main text of the document and that an image is being described. Click Save & Close.
