## Student Briefingor exercise

- x Students should keep in mind that they are evaluathingking needed to learn clinical procedures. These procedures will require decisions.
- x Decisions can be prentrustable or entrustable. They cannot be memorized effectively nor are they acquired by experience alone.
- x The flipped classroom causes attention to be focused on comparing current decisions in studying vs. future decisions in the clinic.
- x Awareness of the EPAs and younderstanding of how to acquire entrustability can be powerful in selling yourself to residency programs. Try to give your own explanation as someone who is aware of entrustable thinking.
